The Consecration and Ordination of a Bishop

The ministry of the Church is the ministry of Christ, its chief shepherd and high priest. Those who are ordained are called to share Christ's work: to speak in his name and build up the Church of which Christ is the head. This service of ordination perpetuates a pattern of ministry in direct continuity - through a long line of succession – with the apostles. Just as Jesus commissioned His first disciples, so by the laying on of hands the Archbishop will commission this disciple to mission. That is, to witness to the resurrection and to preach the good news of salvation in all the world. The particular role of a bishop while remaining a deacon and priest - is to proclaim and guard the faith, to preside at the sacraments, to lead the Church's prayer and to hand on its ministry. During the service, the candidates will be asked to confirm their commitment to these priorities. The Archbishop will ask all who are present to undertake to support the ordination of these candidates, not least because as bishops they will act not just on behalf of particular local Christian communities, but of the whole Church. This is followed by the invocation of the Holy Spirit and the laying on of hands. Jane, Martin and Robert will be anointed with sacred oil, signifying their role of leadership within the royal priesthood of Christ's people; they will receive a copy of the Holy Scriptures, both to remind them of their duty to proclaim the Gospel and of the centrality of God's Word; and they will each receive a Pastoral Staff, symbolising their sharing in the ministry of Christ the Good Shepherd. Christ's mission is the fundamental and unifying reality for all ministry. It turns the Church outwards towards the world that God loved so much that he sent his only Son. It prepares the Church for that goal and end of all things, when Christ himself will present to the Father a world made perfect by his work - when all God's people share in the joyful communion of love that binds the Father and the Son, in the unity of the Holy Spirit.

During the Ordination Prayer, it is customary for the three consecrating bishops, the Archbishop of Canterbury, the Bishop of London and the Bishop of Salisbury, to be joined by other bishops present to lay hands on the ordinands. This will be offered for the Bishop of Hertford and the Bishop of Kingston. However, at the moment of laying on of hands for the Bishop of Ebbsfleet, by gracious restraint, the Bishop of London and the Bishop of Salisbury will step aside and the Bishop of Chester and the Bishop of Rochester will join the Archbishop of Canterbury in the laying on of hands. The other bishops will stand alongside in solidarity and prayer but, with gracious restraint, will refrain from laying on hands. This is to respect the role of the Bishop of Ebbsfleet who will offer episcopal ministry to parishes which are unable, on the grounds of complementarian evangelical theology, to accept the priestly or episcopal ministry of women.

Martin Gainsborough



Martin grew up in SE London, studied in Bristol and at SOAS. He had a career as an academic (Prof of Development Politics at Bristol University), specialised in South East Asia, is an expert on Vietnam where he and his family lived for a number of years, including working in the international aid community (notably for the UNDP). Following ordination, Martin worked in inner city parish ministry, Cathedral ministry, as Chaplain to the Royal Marines' Reserve, and as Bishop's Chaplain (all in

Bristol). He tabled the motion at General Synod in 2020 that led the Church adopt a more ambitious net zero target. Martin is married to Mary and they have three children Annie, Francis and Rosa.

Jane Mainwaring



Jane was ordained as deacon in 2000 and as priest in 2001 in the Diocese of St Edmundsbury and Ipswich. In 2003 she moved to serve within the Diocese of St Albans and has been there ever since. Prior to ordination, she did her first degree at the University of Leeds (Theology and Religious Studies), then worked in Southwark Diocesan Retreat House and did voluntary youth work, followed by a period working for the

YWCA in Coventry, and then three years in Trinity College, Carmarthen, doing an MPhil and PhD, whilst also being part-time chaplaincy assistant. Jane is married to James and they have two children, Elliot and Amelie.

Robert Munro



Born in Manchester, Robert Munro came to faith as an 18year-old, through the ministry of St Mary's Cheadle. After a degree in Maths at Bristol University, he moved to London to study at All Souls College of Applied Theology, while working part-time as a teaching assistant. He went on to train as a teacher at Manchester University before working as a Maths and PE teacher in Hazel Grove, Greater Manchester. He later trained for the ministry at Oak Hill Theological College in

London and was ordained priest in 1994, served his title at St John the Baptist, Hartford, in the Diocese of Chester. In 1997, he was appointed Rector of St Wilfrid's, Davenham, and in 2003 Rector of St Mary's Cheadle with St Cuthbert's. During his time there he also studied for his doctorate from the Reformed Theological Seminary, USA. He has served three terms as Chair of Clergy in Chester Diocese and on the Church of England's General Synod and has been a member of the Dioceses' Commission. He is married to Sarah. They have three adult children and a dog.

The Greeting

The Archbishop greets the people

All Blessed be God, Father, Son and Holy Spirit. Blessed be his kingdom, now and for ever. Amen.

The Archbishop introduces the service

God calls his people to follow Christ, and forms us into a royal priesthood, a holy nation, to declare the wonderful deeds of him who has called us out of darkness into his marvellous light.

The Church is the Body of Christ, the people of God and the dwellingplace of the Holy Spirit. In baptism the whole Church is summoned to witness to God's love and to work for the coming of his kingdom.

To serve this royal priesthood, God has given particular ministries. Bishops are ordained to be shepherds of Christ's flock and guardians of the faith of the apostles, proclaiming the gospel of God's kingdom and leading his people in mission. Obedient to the call of Christ and in the power of the Holy Spirit, they are to gather God's people and celebrate with them the sacraments of the new covenant. Thus formed into a single communion of faith and love, the Church in each place and time is united with the Church in every place and time.

The Bishop of London and the Bishop of Chester say

Reverend Father in God, Robert Munro has been chosen to be Bishop of Ebbsfleet in the Diocese of Canterbury. We present him to be ordained and consecrated to the office of bishop in the Church of God.

The Archbishop asks

Do you believe them to be of godly life and sound learning?

Those presenting respond

We do.

Do you believe them to be duly called to serve God in this ministry?

We do.

The Archbishop turns to the ordinands and says

Do you believe that God is calling you to this ministry?

Ordinands I do so believe.

Archbishop Let the authority for the ordinations be read.

The Provincial Registrar reads the Royal Mandate.

Archbishop Martin, Jane and Robert, you have each taken the oath of allegiance to the Sovereign and the oath of due obedience. You are now required to make the Declaration of Assent.


The Archbishop then reads the Preface to the Declaration of Assent.

The Church of England is part of the One, Holy, Catholic, and Apostolic Church, worshipping the one true God, Father, Son, and Holy Spirit. It professes the faith uniquely revealed in the Holy Scriptures and set forth in the catholic creeds, which faith the Church is called upon to proclaim afresh in each generation. Led by the Holy Spirit, it has borne witness to Christian truth in its historic formularies, the Thirty-nine Articles of Religion, The Book of Common Prayer and the Ordering of Bishops, Priests and Deacons. In the declaration you are about to make, will you affirm your loyalty to this inheritance of faith as your inspiration and guidance under God in bringing the grace and truth of Christ to this generation and making Him known to those in your care?

The Ordinands respond

Clerk in Holy Orders about to be admitted and consecrated to the Bishopric and See for which I have been chosen, do so affirm, and accordingly declare my belief in the faith which is revealed in the Holy Scriptures and set forth in the catholic creeds and to which the historic formularies of the Church of England bear witness; and in public prayer and administration of the sacraments, I will use only the forms of service which are authorized or allowed by Canon.



The Collect

When the time came for their purification according to the law of Moses, Mary and Joseph brought Jesus up to Jerusalem to present him to the Lord (as it is written in the law of the Lord, 'Every firstborn male shall be designated as holy to the Lord'), and they offered a sacrifice according to what is stated in the law of the Lord, 'a pair of turtle-doves or two young pigeons.'

Now there was a man in Jerusalem whose name was Simeon; this man was righteous and devout, looking forward to the consolation of Israel, and the Holy Spirit rested on him. It had been revealed to him by the Holy Spirit that he would not see death before he had seen the Lord's Messiah. Guided by the Spirit, Simeon came into the temple; and when the parents brought in the child Jesus, to do for him what was customary under the law, Simeon took him in his arms and praised God, saying,

'Master, now you are dismissing your servant in peace, according to your word; for my eyes have seen your salvation, which you have prepared in the presence of all peoples, a light for revelation to the Gentiles and for glory to your people Israel.'

And the child's father and mother were amazed at what was being said about him. Then Simeon blessed them and said to his mother Mary, 'This child is destined for the falling and the rising of many in Israel, and to be a sign that will be opposed so that the inner thoughts of many will be revealed—and a sword will pierce your own soul too.'

There was also a prophet, Anna the daughter of Phanuel, of the tribe of Asher. She was of a great age, having lived with her husband for seven years after her marriage, then as a widow to the age of eightyfour. She never left the temple but worshipped there with fasting and prayer night and day. At that moment she came, and began to praise God and to speak about the child to all who were looking for the redemption of Jerusalem.

When they had finished everything required by the law of the Lord, they returned to Galilee, to their own town of Nazareth. The child grew and became strong, filled with wisdom; and the favour of God was upon him.

This is the Gospel of the Lord.

The Creed

All We believe in one God, the Father, the Almighty, maker of heaven and earth, of all that is, seen and unseen. We believe in one Lord, Jesus Christ, the only Son of God, eternally begotten of the Father, God from God, Light from Light, true God from true God, begotten, not made, of one Being with the Father; through him all things were made. For us and for our salvation he came down from heaven, was incarnate from the Holy Spirit and the Virgin Mary and was made man. We believe in one holy catholic and apostolic Church. We acknowledge one baptism for the forgiveness of sins. We look for the resurrection of the dead, and the life of the world to come. Amen.

The Liturgy of Ordination

The Declarations

The ordinands stand before the Archbishop, who addresses the congregation

Archbishop Bishops are called to serve and care for the flock of Christ. Mindful of the Good Shepherd, who laid down his life for his sheep, they are to love and pray for those committed to their charge, knowing their people and being known by them. As principal ministers of word and sacrament, stewards of the mysteries of God, they are to preside at the Lord's table and to lead the offering of prayer and praise. They are to feed God's pilgrim people, and so build up the Body of Christ.

> They are to baptize and confirm, nurturing God's people in the life of the Spirit, and leading them in the way of holiness. They are to discern and foster the gifts of the Spirit in all who follow Christ, commissioning them to minister in his name. They are to preside over the ordination of deacons and priests, and join together in the ordination of bishops.

> As chief pastors, it is their duty to share with their fellow presbyters the oversight of the Church, speaking in the name of God, and expounding the gospel of salvation. With the Shepherd's love, they are to be merciful, but with firmness; to minister discipline, but with compassion. They are to have a special care for the poor, the outcast and those who are in need. They are to seek out those who are lost and lead them home with rejoicing, declaring the absolution and forgiveness of sins to those who turn to Christ.

> Following the example of the prophets and the teaching of the apostles, they are to proclaim the gospel boldly, confront injustice and work for righteousness and peace in all the world.

The Archbishop addresses the ordinands directly

Martin, Jane and Robert we trust that you have weighed and pondered all this, and that you are now fully determined to devote yourself to this ministry to which God has called you. We pray that you may offer to him your best powers of mind and spirit, so that as you follow the rule and teaching of our Lord you may grow up into his likeness, and sanctify the lives of all with whom you have to do.

And now, in order that we may know your mind and purpose, you must make the declarations we put to you.

Do you accept the Holy Scriptures as revealing all things necessary for eternal salvation through faith in Jesus Christ?

Ordinands I do so accept them.

Will you be diligent in prayer, in reading Holy Scripture, and in all studies that will deepen your faith, and fit you to bear witness to the truth of the Gospel?

Ordinands By the help of God, I will.

Will you lead your people in proclaiming his glorious gospel of Christ, so that the good news of salvation may be heard in every place?

Ordinands By the help of God, I will.

Will you teach the doctrine of Christ as the Church of England has received it, will you refute error, and will you hand on entire the faith that is entrusted to you?

Ordinands By the help of God, I will.

Will you be faithful in ordaining and commissioning ministers of the Gospel?

Ordinands By the help of God, I will.

Will you promote peace and reconciliation in the Church and in the world; and will you strive for the visible unity of Christ's Church?

Ordinands By the help of God, I will.

Will you be gentle and merciful for Christ's sake to those who are in need, and speak for those who have no other to speak for them?

Ordinands By the help of God, I will.

Will you endeavour to fashion your own life and that of your household according to the way of Christ and make your home a place of hospitality and welcome?

Ordinands By the help of God, I will.

Will you work with your fellow servants in the Gospel for the sake of the kingdom of God?

Ordinands By the help of God, I will.

Will you accept the discipline of this Church, exercising authority with justice, courtesy and love, and always holding before you the example of Christ?

Ordinands By the help of God, I will.

Will you then, in the strength of the Holy Spirit, continually stir up the gift of God that is in you, that the good news of Christ may be proclaimed in all the world?

Ordinands By the help of God, I will.

The congregation stands and the ordinands turn and face them.

Brothers and sisters, you have heard how great is the charge that Martin, Jane and Robert are ready to undertake, and you have heard their declarations. Is it now your will that they should be ordained?

All It is.

Archbishop Will you continually pray for them?

All We will.

Archbishop Will you uphold and encourage them in their ministry?

All We will.

The ordinands turn to face the Archbishop, who continues

Martin, Jane and Robert, remember always with thanksgiving that God has entrusted to your care Christ's beloved bride, his own flock, bought by the shedding of his blood on the cross.

You are to govern Christ's people in truth, lead them out to proclaim the good news of the kingdom, and prepare them to stand before him when at last he comes in glory.

You cannot bear the weight of this calling in your own strength, but only by the grace and power of God. Pray therefore that you may be conformed more and more to the image of God's Son, so that through the outpouring of the Holy Spirit your life and ministry may be made holy and acceptable to God. Pray earnestly for the gift of the Holy Spirit.

The ordinands and the congregation kneel and silence is kept.

Through them, with their fellow-servants in Christ, increase your Church and renew its ministry, uniting its members in a holy fellowship of truth and love.

Give them humility, that they may use their authority to heal, not to hurt; to build up, not to destroy. Defend them from all evil, that they may, as faithful stewards, be presented blameless with all your household and, at the last, enter your eternal joy, through your Son Jesus Christ our Lord, to whom, with you and your Holy Spirit, belong glory and honour, worship and praise, now and for ever. **Amen.**

The Eucharistic Prayer

It is truly right and just, our duty and our salvation, always and everywhere to give you thanks, Lord, holy Father, almighty and eternal God, through Jesus Christ our Lord. Christ is the Good Shepherd of the whole flock, for which the Holy Spirit ordains bishops to govern the Church bought by the blood of the eternal covenant. In this joyful community of faith, your people, filled with the gifts of the Spirit, assemble together in one communion of love. Here the Gospel is set forth and fulfilled in the Supper of the Lord to make your Church a sign of love and unity for all. Therefore with angels and archangels, and with all the company of heaven, we proclaim your great and glorious name, for ever praising you and singing:

The choir sings

Holy, holy, holy Lord, God of power and might, heaven and earth are full of your glory. Hosanna in the highest.

The Archbishop recalls the Last Supper

Lord, you are holy indeed, the source of all holiness; grant that by the power of your Holy Spirit, and according to your holy will, these gifts of bread and wine may be to us the body and blood of our Lord Jesus Christ;

who, in the same night that he was betrayed, took bread and gave you thanks; he broke it and gave it to his disciples, saying: Take, eat; this is my body which is given for you; do this in remembrance of me.

In the same way, after supper he took the cup and gave you thanks; he gave it to them, saying: Drink this, all of you; this is my blood of the new covenant, which is shed for you and for many for the forgiveness of sins. Do this, as often as you drink it, in remembrance of me.

Deacon Let us proclaim the mystery of faith;

All Christ has died: Christ is risen: Christ will come again. And so, Father, calling to mind his death on the cross, his perfect sacrifice made once for the sins of the whole world; rejoicing in his mighty resurrection and glorious ascension, and looking for his coming in glory, we celebrate this memorial of our redemption. As we offer you this our sacrifice of praise and thanksgiving, we bring before you this bread and this cup and we thank you for counting us worthy to stand in your presence and serve you. Send the Holy Spirit on your people and gather into one in your kingdom all who share this one bread and one cup, so that we, in the company of all the saints, may praise and glorify you for ever, through Jesus Christ our Lord; by whom, and with whom, and in whom, in the unity of the Holy Spirit, all honour and glory be yours, almighty Father, for ever and ever.

Breaking of the Bread

All Jesus Christ is holy, Jesus Christ is Lord, to the glory of God the Father.

The Distribution of Communion

Please come up for Communion as directed by the stewards. All who are regular communicants in their own tradition are welcome to receive the sacrament. If you are not a communicant, you are welcome to come forward at this point in the service to receive a blessing, keeping your hands to your sides. Please ask the priest if you **need a gluten-free host.**

We have returned to offering the chalice at the time of Communion, but please do not feel any pressure to receive from the common cup, as the Church teaches that the Sacrament is received fully in one kind. We request that **you do not intinct (dip) your host in the wine** but either take a sip from the cup or remain with your head bowed. This is for the reasons of good hygiene.

We keep a **prayerful silence** during Communion to allow others to prepare to receive the sacrament or pray afterwards.

During Communion, the choir sings

Lamb of God, you take away the sins of the world, have mercy on us. Lamb of God, you take away the sins of the world, grant us peace.

Prayer after Communion

Silence is kept.

Lord God, the source of truth and love, keep us faithful to the apostles' teaching and fellowship, united in prayer and the breaking of bread, and one in joy and simplicity of heart, in Jesus Christ our Lord.

All Amen.

All We thank you, gracious Father, for welcoming your children to feast in your kingdom; by your love unite us and with your Spirit send us, in the name of Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen.
