A FRIENDLY TALK Life in a Changing City – Canterbury 1825-1910

Tuesday 10 February 2026, 10:30-11:30 in the Clagett Auditorium

Popular speaker Doreen Rosman will continue her series of talks about the history of Canterbury. A boy born in 1825, who survived into the 20th Century, would have lived through a time of major technological change: the coming of railways, gas and electric lighting, telephones and cinemas, bicycles, cars, and even an aeroplane. This talk explores how these developments would have impacted on his life, and how the city changed before his eyes. Doreen Rosman taught history at the University of Kent. Her publications include, Canterbury: A History since 1500, the story of a city and its people.

The Dean's travel this week

The Dean has travelled on Wednesday 4th to Austin Texas for a few days. This will include preaching at the Seminary of the Southwest and All Saints' Episcopal Church. He will also lead the adult education session on Sunday morning in that parish. He will co-lead a visit to see the oldest surviving manuscripts of Chaucer's Canterbury Tales held in the Harry Ransom Centre (it holds many literary archives including that of TS Eliot) and speak at a Fundraising Reception. Finally, he will give the annual Bailey Lecture which will focus on pilgrimage. He flies back over Sunday night to return to work in the UK on Monday 9th.

Faith, Culture, and the Arts Seminar – 11th February, 11am-1pm

The University of Kent and Canterbury Cathedral present a new regular seminar on Faith, Culture, and the Arts, to explore key themes of theology, culture, spirituality, the arts, and social justice in an accessible and inclusive setting. It is organised by the Michael Ramsey Chair in Theology, Professor of Faith, Culture, and the Arts, Jonathan Arnold. The first seminar will take place in the Community Studio, The Precincts, CT1 2EH, on Wednesday 11th February at 11am. Our first speaker will be Rev Jon Marlow, who will be speaking on Provocation and Invitation: Engaging Theologically with 'Hear Us' at Canterbury Cathedral. Jon is Head of Vocations for the Diocese of Canterbury. Wednesdays following Evensong on these days March 1&4, 8&11, 15&18.
