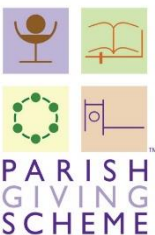
Cover Image: The Compass Rose

The Compass Rose is a symbol of the worldwide Anglican Communion. The Compass Rose is set in the nave of the Cathedral and Metropolitan Church of Christ in Canterbury. The Greek text reads "The truth shall set you free" (John 8.32).

The First Reading

Ecclesiasticus 24.1-12

The Gospel *John 1.10-18*

The Lord be with you.

And also with you.

Hear the Gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ according to John.

Glory to you, O Lord.

The true light, which enlightens everyone, was in the world, and the world came into being through him; yet the world did not know him. He came to what was his own, and his own people did not accept him. But to all who received him, who believed in his name, he gave power to become children of God, who were born, not of blood or of the will of the flesh or of the will of man, but of God.

And the Word became flesh and lived among us, and we have seen his glory, the glory as of a father's only son, full of grace and truth. (John testified to him

and cried out, 'This was he of whom I said, "He who comes after me ranks ahead of me because he was before me."'") From his fullness we have all received, grace upon grace. The law indeed was given through Moses; grace and truth came through Jesus Christ. No one has ever seen God. It is God the only Son, who is close to the Father's heart, who has made him known.

This is the Gospel of the Lord.

The President breaks the consecrated bread, saying

We break the bread of life,

Sit as the President and other ministers begin

The Distribution of Communion

Please come up for Communion as directed by the stewards. All baptised Christians who receive communion in their own church are encouraged to receive today. If you are accompanied by children who do not yet receive, please bring them with you to receive a blessing. They should not be left on their own.

*If you are not a communicant, you are welcome to come forward at this point in the service to receive a blessing, keeping your hands to your sides. Please ask the priest if you **need a gluten-free host**.*

We request that **you do not intinct (dip) your host in the wine** but either take a sip from the cup or remain with your head bowed. This is for the reasons of good hygiene.

If you wish to receive communion without climbing the steps to the High Altar, please join the line for the station in the North-East Transept.

We keep a **prayerful silence** during Communion to allow others to prepare to receive the sacrament or pray afterwards.

During Communion, the choir sings the Agnus Dei

O Lamb of God, that takest away the sins of the world, have mercy upon us.

O Lamb of God, that takest away the sins of the world, grant us thy peace.

The Blessing of Epiphany Chalk

Stand as the President moves to the Lectern to meet the children and says

Let us pray.

Silence is kept

Our help is in the name of the Lord,
who has made heaven and earth.

The Lord shall watch over your going out and your coming in;
from this time forth for evermore.

The chalk is blessed

Blessed are you, Lord our God: in the home of Mary and Joseph
you provided a dwelling-place on earth for your eternal Word.

Bless this chalk,
that those who mark their doorways with it
may know your blessing in their home,
and share your love with all who cross its threshold;
we make our prayer through Christ our Lord.

Amen.

The Dismissal

The President says

Christ, who by his incarnation gathered into one
things earthly and heavenly,
fill you with peace and goodwill
and make you partakers of the divine nature;
and the blessing of God almighty,
the Father, the Son, and the Holy Spirit,
be among you and remain with you always.
