Friends' Event

Join us on **Thursday, 17 October at 10.30** in the Claggett Auditorium for another FRIENDS' TALK: The Archbishop's Walking Stick – a Canterbury Journey. Canon Roger Symon's Canterbury journey began in 1942 as a Cathedral Chorister, and ended seventy years later when he stepped down from the Cathedral's Fabric Advisory Committee. For forty years in between, he either lived in the Cathedral Precincts as a schoolboy or Canon, or held appointments in some way connected to the Cathedral – as a member of the Lambeth Palace staff, or the Cathedral Fabric Committee while in retirement. In this talk, Canon Symon will give an insight into the heavy responsibilities which weigh on the Archbishop of Canterbury in his role as senior bishop of the whole Anglican Communion, at home and overseas. He introduces us to Presidents and Primates across the world whom he has met on overseas visits with the Archbishop, and explain why, throughout his life, he has felt deeply attached to our Cathedral – its community, history and architecture – and why it remains his abiding spiritual home. £10 Friends, £15 Friends' guests, includes tea and coffee on arrival.

EYE-WITNESS Stories from Israel-Palestine

The Very Reverend Nick Papadopoulos, Dean of Salisbury Cathedral and former Canon Treasurer of Canterbury Cathedral, will share some of his experiences during the three months he spent earlier this year as part of an international church team on an "Accompaniment Programme" in East Jerusalem.

Thursday 31st October 2024: Journeying Together: an Intergenerational Pilgrimage and exhibition workshop

As part of our theme of 'Journeys', and in support of our Cross-Currents exhibition, you are warmly invited to join us for a pilgrimage to Canterbury Cathedral. Suitable for all ages, you can make your pilgrimage as long or as short as you wish - a gentle stroll from Westgate Gardens or the full 10 miles from St Mary's Church, Chilham; half an hour or half a day. We will start our pilgrimage in Wye, with stops where you can join us along the way. The most accessible sections are from St Mary's Church, Chilham to the train station, along the River Stour to Westgate Gardens, and on to the Cathedral. Alternately, you can hop on the train and walk just a section, but please do join us in whatever way suits you. We also invite you to gather natural items along the way to mark your journey. At the end of the pilgrimage, you will then have the opportunity to participate in a workshop with Frances Carlile, the artist behind our Cross Currents exhibition to craft these items into your own unique boat, which will be added to the larger fleet inside the Cathedral as a symbol of your day's pilgrimage and the longer journey of life.

Canterbury Community Shelter (CCS) - Catching Lives

CCS is a winter shelter for adults who are homeless in Canterbury. The shelter is run by local homelessness charity Catching Lives, in partnership with local churches. We plan to open from mid-December 2024 to mid-March 2025, with space for up to 15 people a night. Catching Lives' paid staff will cover evenings and waking nights, supported by teams of volunteers who cook evening meals, transport bedding, and provide a warm welcome. Catching Lives will be working with the council and other local agencies to help people move on from CCS into more stable accommodation.

Volunteers – can you help?

Kitchen volunteers: cooking and serving a hot evening meal at Catching Lives' Centre on Station Road East. We meet shelter guests at the Centre around 6pm, share a meal, and then staff will walk with guests to that night's venue. **Host volunteers:** welcoming guests as they arrive at the church, providing refreshments and maybe playing board games and chatting to people as they settle ahead of lights out. **Volunteer drivers:** transporting bulky bedding packs between the Centre and churches, ideally with access to an estate car.
