A FRIENDLY TALK Becket – the Murder and What Happened Next?

Almost every visitor to Canterbury has been told a version of Becket's murder – even if it is only the nursery rhyme, Here We Go Round the Mulberry Bush. But what really did happen in the lead up to the Archbishop's assassination? Before the days of social media and television, news of Becket's murder reverberated across Europe. In the second of her talks, Cathedral Guide Maggie Price will explain what the effects of the aftershock of Becket's demise meant for the church – in Rome as well as England – and also the citizens and Crown. Season of Safeguarding Worship and Events, 16th-23rd November 2025

This November, we will be marking our first Season of Safeguarding with a number of events and services to lament, listen and learn from the survivors of abuse, and reflect on failures of the Church of England to keep everyone safe.

These will include: Safeguarding Sunday (16 November), with Rev'd Ravi Holi as preacher; time for discussion over coffee; a designated Chapel as a place of prayer for Victims and Survivors; an opportunity to tie ribbons on the railings outside Cathedral House to create a LOUDfence to show support and solidarity for those affected by abuse; publication of our Victim's and Survivor's Charter; and more. In collaboration with the Diocese of Canterbury, this week brings together parishes across the diocese for focused reflection, prayer, and safeguarding activities.

The Holy Innocents Chapel will be a dedicated place of prayer for Victims and Survivors; where lay and ordained Chaplains will be available to listen from 10 am to 4 pm. LOUDfence Installation, 16th - 23rd November

An opportunity to tie ribbons on the railings outside Cathedral House to create a LOUDfence, to show support and solidarity for those affected by abuse

The aim of LOUDfence is to give survivors, the entire church and wider society a voice. LOUDfence celebrates the act of openness and truth telling. This provides a direct counter challenge to any culture which seeks to hide in the silence.
