27th January 2024 5.30pm Quire On 27 January 1945, Auschwitz was liberated and the full horrors of the Holocaust were exposed to the world. Each year this day is kept as Holocaust Memorial Day, when we remember the six million Jews and all those who lost their lives in the Nazi persecution, and the victims of other genocides and religious persecutions throughout the world. It is a day to commit ourselves to learning the lessons of the past, and to work for an end to hatred and a better future for all.

The theme for HMD 2023 is Fragility of Freedom. Genocides do not begin in a vacuum and they are often the result of a long period where the freedoms of various groups are restricted or taken away. This year's theme allows us to reflect upon the part that the silence of others can play when freedoms are in danger, and to focus on the freedoms that we take for granted and must hold dear.


This service will be livestreamed and you may be seen on camera, although we will not deliberately take any close-ups of the congregation.

The spirit of the Lord God is upon me, because the Lord has anointed me; he has sent me to bring good news to the oppressed, to bind up the brokenhearted, to proclaim liberty to the captives, and release to the prisoners; to proclaim the year of the Lord's favour, and the day of vengeance of our God; to comfort all who mourn; to provide for those who mourn in Zion— to give them a garland instead of ashes, the oil of gladness instead of mourning, the mantle of praise instead of a faint spirit.

They will be called oaks of righteousness, the planting of the Lord, to display his glory. They shall build up the ancient ruins, they shall raise up the former devastations; they shall repair the ruined cities, the devastations of many generations.

For I the Lord love justice, I hate robbery and wrongdoing; I will faithfully give them their recompense, and I will make an everlasting covenant with them. Second Reading

Galatians 5.13-23

You were called to freedom, brothers and sisters; only do not use your freedom as an opportunity for self-indulgence, but through love become slaves to one another. For the whole law is summed up in a single commandment, 'You shall love your neighbour as yourself.' If, however, you bite and devour one another, take care that you are not consumed by one another. Live by the Spirit, I say, and do not gratify the desires of the flesh. For what the flesh desires is opposed to the Spirit, and what the Spirit desires is opposed to the flesh; for these are opposed to each other, to prevent you from doing what you want. But if you are led by the Spirit, you are not subject to the law. Now the works of the flesh are obvious: fornication, impurity, licentiousness, idolatry, sorcery, enmities, strife, jealousy, anger, quarrels, dissensions, factions, envy, drunkenness, carousing, and things like these. I am warning you, as I warned you before: those who do such things will not inherit the kingdom of God.

By contrast, the fruit of the Spirit is love, joy, peace, patience, kindness, generosity, faithfulness, gentleness, and self-control. There is no law against such things.

As we stand in commemoration, we remember before God all those who lost their lives in the violence of the Holocaust, and all other victims of genocide and racial and religious persecution throughout the world.

A time of silence is kept. As the Anthem begins, we sit.

Kaddish said in Aramaic

The Kaddish is a prayer in praise of God. Following Job's response to the death of his children (Job 1:21) – "God gives, and God has taken away; let God's name be praised" – it has become traditional in Judaism to say Kaddish at a time of mourning, or when remembering those who have died.
