Palm Crosses please

As we approach Ash Wednesday, the virgers are collecting Palm Crosses from last year, to make the ash for use as we enter the season of Lent. This is an ancient tradition, so please bring any palm crosses that you have kept since last Holy Week, and they will be turned into the ash used to start our Lenten journey in 2026.

Evensong on Thursdays, after Easter

After a number of years, Choral Evensong will be returning on Thursday evenings at 5:30pm and will replace our current service of Evening Prayer with Silence. Thursday Evensongs will be sung by the boys of the Cathedral Choir and is an exciting new development for them. For the time being for various reasons this service will not be live-streamed. We will be looking to find an alternative time for collective silent prayer.

Ecumenical Contemporary Theology Group: Wed 18 February, 5 pm

At St Peter's Methodist Church: Rev. Alan Race, Chair of the World Congress of Faiths, and Emeritus Professor Richard Norman, a patron of Humanists UK, will give a double-act talk on 'Doing Difference Differently: Christian, Humanist, and Inter-Faith Dialogue'. There is an entrance charge of £5 to cover costs but people in full-time education are welcome to attend free.

Breaking bread, building community

The Dean and his partner David Hamilton invite people who consider themselves as members of the cathedral worshipping communities to join them in the Deanery for a very simple Lenten Meal. This will be hearty vegetarian (gluten free) soup, bread rolls, cheese and fruit. Each time we will host up to 12 people (maximum number possible around our large dining table). It is level access but there is no universal access toilets (most people seem to be able to access them but not big enough for larger electric wheelchairs). The times are 1.00 -3.00pm on Sundays following the Cathedral Eucharist or 6.30-8.30pm on Wednesdays following Evensong on these days March 1&4, 8&11, 15&18. Booking details are here with the QR Code and need you to indicate a first and second choice so that we can try and accommodate as many people as possible using all 72 slots.
