Welcome

Canterbury Cathedral is the seat of the Archbishop of Canterbury, the Cathedral Church of the Diocese of Canterbury, the Mother Church of the Anglican Communion, and a place of pilgrimage welcoming visitors from across the world.

For over fourteen hundred years God has been worshipped here. With its roots in the Benedictine tradition, the ongoing daily pattern of morning and evening prayer and Eucharist continues the prayers and praises of countless generations in this Cathedral.

Alongside this we host a large number of special services, some regular, some occasional. These mark the feasts of the Church's year and significant events in the life of our local community, or offer opportunities for exploring faith and spirituality in creative and diverse ways.

Whether you are a regular worshipper with us, someone who has come to the Cathedral for a special event, or a visitor making a once in a lifetime journey to Canterbury, you are most welcome and an equal part of this community whose story reaches back to Augustine's mission to England in 597.

We invite everyone who attends our services to contribute to the ongoing costs of maintaining this beautiful Cathedral and investing in our ongoing ministry. It costs us approximately £30,000 a day to care for the building and people of this place and to continue to invest in the high quality of music that is offered here. WORSHIP

Regular worship

At the heart of Cathedral life is the regular rhythm of daily prayer. The day begins each morning with the quiet, said services of Morning Prayer and the 8.00am Eucharist, and ends with the service of Choral Evensong or Said Evening Prayer. In term time Children's Church meets on Sunday mornings. The Cathedral's principal act of worship every week is the 11.00am Sunday Choral Eucharist.

MUSIC

Visiting Choirs

The voluntary liturgical parish choir, the Choir of **St Martin-in-the-Fields**, joins with clergy and laity in leading worship on Sundays and at significant festivals in the church year including Christmas, Holy Week and Easter. It strives to be amongst the leading voluntary church choirs in the UK, performing a wide range of sacred choral repertoire on a regular basis to a high standard. As well as its busy programme of church services, they give occasional concerts at St Martin's and in recent years has toured to Paris and South Africa, as well as visiting UK cathedrals.

Canterbury Chamber Choir, founded in 1995, puts on regular concerts of sacred and secular choral and dramatic musical works. Their concerts, with conductor Peter Fitcher, aim to entertain and educate as well as to help local charities raise much needed funds.

The Gundulf Consort is an ad hoc group of experienced church musicians based in Rochester, formed primarily to act as a cathedral visiting choir. In addition to singing in cathedrals, mostly at Canterbury, the Consort has an annual residency at Himmerod Abbey in Germany, singing 'English Cathedral Evensong' for a week in August ending on the Patronal Festival of Himmerod's founder, St. Bernard of Clairvaux.

St Wulfram's Church Choir is the parish choir of the civic church of Grantham. Membership is drawn from children and teenagers, who attend 18 different local schools, and voluntary adults. When choristers graduate from the children's sections of the choir, they join the SATB youth choir. The choir is also boosted by an internship scheme for early career church musicians. The director is Dr Tim Williams, who has been in post since 2008, during which time the choristers have visited many major cathedrals. This is the third time that the choir has sung at Canterbury Cathedral.

Voces Concinentes are a mixed voice choir made up of experienced singers from Canterbury and East Kent and are conducted by Miles Banbery.

MUSIC

The Whyte Effect was founded in 2018 and takes its name from the 16th century English composer, Robert Whyte, who worked in both Cambridge and London, like many members of the group. It was formed as a peripatetic group to provide choral music for churches who no longer have a choir, and to deputise at cathedrals. It aims to replicate the effect that the music of Whyte and his contemporaries had on English music almost 500 years ago and to enable great works of choral art to be heard by all.

Organ Recital by Tom Bell, Concert Organist Messiaen, Livre du Saint Sacrement (1984)

On Friday 17 July 2026, renowned concert organist Tom Bell will play the Livre du Saint Sacrement, written in 1984 by Olivier Messiaen (1908-1992). Over 100 minutes long, the Livre du Saint Sacrement is a vast cycle in eighteen pieces, collectively presenting a meditation on the Blessed Sacrament: the body and blood of Jesus, in the form of bread and wine at the Eucharist (Holy Communion).

The concert will start at 7.30pm and will last for approximately 105 minutes with no interval.
