The Very Reverend David Monteith

David Monteith grew up in County Fermanagh, Northern Ireland in a Church of Ireland family during 'The Troubles'. He went on to study Zoology at Durham University and then worked as a lay pastoral assistant in Birmingham before training for ordination at St John's College Nottingham.

He was ordained deacon in 1993 and priest in 1994 at St Philip's Cathedral Birmingham serving as a curate in Kings Heath before moving on to St Martin-in-the-Fields, Trafalgar Square, London. Ministry then moved to Holy Trinity South Wimbledon where he led on forming the Merton Priory Team Ministry as well as being the Area Dean of Merton.

In 2008 he was appointed Canon Chancellor of the Cathedral Church of St Martin Leicester and was then appointed Acting Archdeacon of Leicester before becoming Dean of Leicester in 2013. He then had oversight of the reinterment of King Richard III following his discovery in the nearby car park and then led the major restoration and redevelopment project Leicester Cathedral Revealed which will complete in 2024. He chairs the College of Deans of the Church of England.

David shares his life in a Civil Partnership with David Hamilton, a counsellor focussing primarily on palliative and bereavement care. Barney the rescued lurcher also shares their household!

The Kallihura Bible

The Bible used for oaths in this service was published in London in 1853 and belonged to Erasmus Augustine Kallihura, from the Inuit people of Greenland, who studied at St Augustine's Missionary College in Canterbury. The Bible is kept in the Cathedral Library.

A Message from Bec

The great Archbishops of Canterbury, Lanfranc (1070-1089) and Anselm (1093-1109) came from the Abbey of Bec in Normandy. Since the restoration of monastic life at Bec in 1948, strong links of love, prayer, fellowship and mutual visitation have developed between us, enshrined in a covenant in 2007. Every Thursday we pray for each other in our services, as a particular expression of our desire for the unity of the Church. Sadly this season of the year makes it impossible for the communities (one of brothers, and one of sisters) to send representatives to this service; but a candle made by the sisters stands in the Cathedral today, and they have sent this message:

It would then be our great pleasure to welcome you with the members of the Chapter the year after, in order to continue these exchanges that are so rich in the promise of communion, thus responding to the urgent call of Our Lord "May they be one so that the world may believe".

Presentation

Archbishop and people of Canterbury, I present to you David Monteith who has been Dean of Leicester and I commend him to you.

The Archbishop

Thank you for your commendation. Let the Letters Patent be read.

The representative of the Crown Appointments Secretary reads the Letters Patent, which are then handed to the Receiver General who presents them to the Archbishop.

The Archbishop reads this Preface and the Dean Designate makes the Declaration of Assent

The Church of England is part of the One, Holy, Catholic and Apostolic Church, worshipping the one true God, Father, Son and Holy Spirit. It professes the faith uniquely revealed in the Holy Scriptures and set forth in the catholic creeds, which faith the Church is called upon to proclaim afresh in each generation. Led by the Holy Spirit, it has borne witness to Christian truth in its historic formularies, the Thirty-nine Articles of Religion, *The Book of Common Prayer* and the Ordering of Bishops, Priests and Deacons. In the declaration you are about to make, will you affirm your loyalty to this inheritance of faith as your inspiration and guidance under God in bringing the grace and truth of Christ to this generation and making Him known to those in your care?

The Dean Designate says

I, David Robert Malvern Monteith, do so affirm, and accordingly declare my belief in the faith which is revealed in the Holy Scriptures and set forth in the catholic creeds and to which the historic formularies of the Church of England bear witness; and in public prayer and administration of the sacraments, I will use only the forms of service which are authorized or allowed by Canon.

The Diocesan Registrar administers the Oaths, which are taken on the Kallihura Bible.

- I, David Robert Malvern Monteith, do swear that I will be faithful and bear true allegiance to His Majesty King Charles III, his heirs and successors, according to law: So help me God.
- I, David Robert Malvern Monteith, do swear by Almighty God that I will pay true and canonical obedience to the Lord Archbishop of Canterbury and his successors in all things lawful and honest: So help me God.

The Diocesan Registrar reads the Archbishop's Mandate

The Diocesan Registrar hands the mandate to the Archbishop who delivers it to the Dean Designate and blesses him:

Dear brother in Christ, all is now ready for you to be installed as Dean of the Cathedral and Metropolitical Church of Christ Canterbury. Take this charge; preach the Good News of God's power to save, and administer his sacraments of love and healing: take care to preside over the Chapter of this Cathedral Church that it may be a true mother to all the churches of this diocese and of the Anglican Communion, in the name of the father, and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit.

The God of peace who brought again from the dead our Lord Jesus Christ, that great shepherd of the sheep, through the blood of the everlasting covenant make you perfect in every good work to do his will, working in you that which is well pleasing in his sight; through Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen.

The Dean Designate gives the Archbishop's Mandate to the Senior Canon, The Reverend Dr Tim Naish, and is then vested in a cope and led by the Residentiary Canons through the pulpitum to the return stalls of the Quire as the choir sings:

The Installation

The Senior Canon

Mr Vice Dean, I present to you David Monteith to be installed into the office of Dean, in accordance with the provisions of this Mandate and the customs of this Cathedral and Metropolitical Church.

The Vice Dean, The Venerable Dr William Adam, receives the Mandate from the Senior Canon and places the Dean in the Dean's Stall:

In the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit. Amen.

By virtue of this Mandate I induct and admit you into this office, duty and ministry of Dean in this Church with all the rights, members and appurtenances thereof. May the Lord guard your coming in and your going out from this time forth for evermore. Amen. The Dean kneels in his Stall and the Vice Dean offers this prayer:

Have mercy we beseech you, O Lord God, on your servant David, appointed to direct the Deanery of this Church; protect him by your grace, and assist him by the Holy Spirit, that the increase of his office may forward him not only in respect of your true worship, but also for the advancement of the study of religion, and to be an example to other Priests, and particularly the Canons, in faithfully serving you, and guide him into the way of eternal Salvation; through Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen.

Be among us as a person of the Eucharist, presiding among us when we celebrate the Lord's death and resurrection, sharing regularly with us in this Sacrament of Holy Communion that we may grow in unity and love, and together proclaim the death of the Lord until he comes.

Members of the Cathedral Foundation stand as the Dean makes the Oath required by the Cathedral statutes.

Historically, the oaths would have been taken in the Chapter House, with the Dean taking his place as head of the Foundation in the Abbot's Chair. The Dean takes the bible in his right hand and takes the Statutory Oath as follows:

I, David Monteith, who have been appointed Dean of this Cathedral and Metropolitical Church by the King's Majesty, and rightly and canonically instituted, do call God to witness, and by these God's Holy Gospels do swear that to the best of my power I will well and faithfully serve in this Church according to the Ordinances and Statutes of the same, and that all its goods, lands, tenements, rents, possessions, its right, liberties and privileges, and all other things as well moveable (their reasonable use excepted) as immoveable, and all other interests of the same Church I will well and profitably guard, defend and keep, and I will take care as far as in me lies that the like be done by others. And each and every Statute and Ordinance of this Church, in so far as they concern me as Dean of this Church, I will well and faithfully observe and cause to be observed by the other Ministers of this Church, and I will not obtain nor accept any dispensation for the purpose of avoiding or relaxing this Oath. So help me God and by these his Holy Gospels of God.

The Dean then receives promises of due obedience from members of the Foundation

We, members of the Foundation of the Cathedral and Metropolitical Church of Christ at Canterbury, do swear that we have paid, promised or are about to pay nothing directly or indirectly for the acquisition of our positions or duties. And furthermore, that so long as we remain in this Church, we shall observe with inviolacy to the best of our strength all the Ordinances and Statutes of this Church, so far as they concern us and are not inconsistent with the customs of this age according to the common understanding of trustworthy people. In addition we shall show the obedience owed to the Chapter; lastly we shall diligently attend to the advantage and honour of this Church, so help us God
