WE THE PEOPLES OF THE UNITED NATIONS DETERMINED

to save succeeding generations from the scourge of war, which twice in our lifetime has brought untold sorrow to mankind, and to reaffirm faith in fundamental human rights, in the dignity and worth of the human person, in the equal rights of men and women and of nations large and small, and to establish conditions under which justice and respect for the obligations arising from treaties and other sources of international law can be maintained, and to promote social progress and better standards of life in larger freedom,

AND FOR THESE ENDS

to practice tolerance and live together in peace with one another as good neighbours, and to unite our strength to maintain international peace and security, and to ensure, by the acceptance of principles and the institution of methods, that armed force shall not be used, save in the common interest, and to employ international machinery for the promotion of the economic and social advancement of all peoples,

Reading 1 *John 4.7-21*

Beloved, let us love one another, because love is from God; everyone who loves is born of God and knows God. Whoever does not love does not know God, for God is love. God's love was revealed among us in this way: God sent his only Son into the world so that we might live through him. In this is love, not that we loved God but that he loved us and sent his Son to be the atoning sacrifice for our sins. Beloved, since God loved us so much, we also ought to love one another. No one has ever seen God; if we love one another, God abides in us, and his love is perfected in us.

By this we know that we abide in him and he in us, because he has given us of his Spirit. And we have seen and do testify that the Father has sent his Son as the Savior of the world. God abides in those who confess that Jesus is the Son of God, and they abide in God. So we have known and believe the love that God has for us.

God is love, and those who abide in love abide in God, and God abides in them. Love has been perfected among us in this: that we may have boldness on the day of judgment, because as he is, so are we in this world. There is no fear in love, but perfect love casts out fear; for fear has to do with punishment, and whoever fears has not reached perfection in love. We love because he first loved us. Those who say, "I love God," and hate a brother or sister are liars, for those who do not love a brother or sister, whom they have seen, cannot love God, whom they have not seen. The commandment we have from him is this: those who love God must love their brothers and sisters also.

Short Readings and Prayers

The following articles are from the Universal Declaration of Human Rights and each has a prayer which focusses upon the right enshrined in the article. This is part of the Preamble to the Declaration:

Whereas recognition of the inherent dignity and of the equal and inalienable rights of all members of the human family is the foundation of freedom, justice and peace in the world,

Whereas disregard and contempt for human rights have resulted in barbarous acts which have outraged the conscience of mankind, and the advent of a world in which human beings shall enjoy freedom of speech and belief and freedom from fear and want has been proclaimed as the highest aspiration of the common people, Whereas the peoples of the United Nations have in the Charter reaffirmed their faith in fundamental human rights, in the dignity and worth of the human person and in the equal rights of men and women and have determined to promote social progress and better standards of life in larger freedom,

Now, therefore, The General Assembly Proclaims this Universal Declaration of Human Rights as a common standard of achievement for all peoples and all nations.

Article 1 - All human beings are born free and equal in dignity and rights.

We give thanks to God that all peoples, in every place and time are created with dignity and invited to use their liberty for the good of all. Bless those across the world who defend the rights of vulnerable people through the courts and the laws, through advocacy and the media. Bring healing to those whose dignity has been harmed or denied. Lord hear us, lord graciously hear us.

Article 4 - No one shall be held in slavery or servitude; slavery and the slave trade shall be prohibited in all their forms.

Before God, we lament the sin of slavery both historically and in the present day. We pray for those who are modern day slaves working across the world as cheap labour, as trafficked sex workers, as children abused by adults. We pray for those who seek to break these cycles of harm and for those who assist those who have been slaves to reclaim their lives with dignity and purpose.

Lord hear us, Lord graciously hear us.

Article 14 - Everyone has the right to seek and to enjoy in other countries asylum from persecution.

We pray at this time for the many peoples of our world who are on the move, fleeing war and famine and moving because of the impact of climate change. We pray for those who have recently come to our shores, for those who work on Border Force and all who process asylum claims, for those who work alongside refugees and asylum seekers including the many voluntary and statutory agencies, amongst them KRAN in this city.

Lord hear us, Lord graciously hear us.

Article 18 - Everyone has the right to freedom of thought, conscience and religion

We pray for our nation, for His Majesty the King and his government. We pray for our local and national political leaders that they will seek the common good wherever possible sowing seeds of unity rather than of division. We give thanks for the peaceful life of Canterbury with all our different communities and pray that each of us may offer to one another the space we need to live and to thrive. Lord hear us, **Lord graciously hear us**.
