Divine Light - The Stained Glass of England's Cathedrals. Wednesday 22 April 2026, 14:30-15:30 in the Clagett Auditorium. Visitors are often captivated by the stained glass of England's cathedrals, but few realise that it represents a significant national art collection. From one of the earliest stained glass schemes in Canterbury to mark the murder of Thomas Becket, the stained glass of England's cathedrals represents a significant national art collection and spans 900 years. Inspired by the book she has compiled entitled Divine Light, Dr Janet Gough OBE will speak to Friends about this stunning and enlightening subject.

Installation of the Archbishop - tickets for Cathedral Community

Wednesday 25 March 2026 sees the Ceremonial Installation Service for the 106th Archbishop of Canterbury, The Right Reverend and Right Honourable Dame Sarah Mullally DBE. Breaking bread, building community

The Dean and his partner David Hamilton invite people who consider themselves as members of the cathedral worshipping communities to join them in the Deanery for a very simple Lenten Meal. This will be hearty vegetarian (gluten free) soup, bread rolls, cheese and fruit. Each time we will host up to 12 people (maximum number possible around our large dining table). It is level access but there is no universal access toilets (most people seem to be able to access them but not big enough for larger electric wheelchairs). The times are 1.00 -3.00pm on Sundays following the Cathedral Eucharist or 6.30-8.30pm on Wednesdays following Evensong on these days March 1&4, 8&11, 15&18.
