Canterbury Cathedral March 2023

Welcome

Canterbury Cathedral is the seat of the Archbishop of Canterbury, the Cathedral Church of the Diocese of Canterbury, the Mother Church of the Anglican Communion, and a place of pilgrimage welcoming visitors from across the world.

For over fourteen hundred years God has been worshipped here. With its roots in the Benedictine tradition, the ongoing daily pattern of morning and evening prayer and Eucharist continues the prayers and praises of countless generations in this Cathedral.

Alongside this we host a large number of special services, some regular, some occasional. These mark the feasts of the Church's year and significant events in the life of our local community, or offer opportunities for exploring faith and spirituality in creative and diverse ways.

Whether you are a regular worshipper with us, someone who has come to the Cathedral for a special event, or a visitor making a once in a lifetime journey to Canterbury, you are most welcome and an equal part of this community whose story reaches back to Augustine's mission to England in 597 AD.

Visiting Choirs

The OKS choir is formed of alumni of The King's School Canterbury. The school sings services in the cathedral every Sunday throughout term time and all OKS members enjoyed this tradition during their time at the school before heading to university and into their various careers. Many were choral scholars at university and continue to sing professionally today. The group is directed by the conductor Stephen Barlow (OKS and former Canterbury Chorister).

The Occasional Singers is a group of local singers who meet a few times each year to sing the services in the Cathedral. The choir is generally directed by one of the Cathedral organists and gives an opportunity for local singers to lead the worship during the Cathedral Choir's holidays.

St Clement's Church Choir sings the regular services in the Cinque Port town of Sandwich. Music is traditional and is based around its enthusiastic open-access SATB adult choir which includes members from all walks of life. It values the opportunity to sing in its local cathedral in Canterbury as well as other cathedrals in the south-east.

St Stephen's, Canterbury

St Stephen's Church Choir draws singers from across Canterbury who enjoy singing a wide range of sacred music to a high standard. The choir sings two choral services each Sunday and also enjoys the opportunity to sing regularly in Canterbury Cathedral and elsewhere, including cathedrals in Rochester, Chelmsford, Salisbury, Chester, and Rheims in recent years. St Stephen's Church Choir is directed by Stephen Barker.

Lees Court Music is a Canterbury based chamber choir which sings as a visiting choir at English cathedrals, at weddings and events, and in concerts in small country churches in Kent in support of local fundraising.

Concerts

An Informal Organ Recital by Robin Walker, the Cathedral's Assistant Organist, will take place on Friday 24 March 2023. This will start at 6.15pm in the Cathedral Quire, will last approximately 45 minutes and will be free of charge with a retiring collection.

The day begins each morning with the quiet, said services of Morning Prayer (Matins) and the 8.00am Eucharist, and ends with the service of Choral Evensong with music from the Cathedral Choir or one of the many excellent visiting choirs who come to sing during the Cathedral Choir's holidays. The Cathedral's principal act of worship every week is the 11.00am Sunday Choral Eucharist.
