**THE MOST REVEREND AND RIGHT HONOURABLE
DAME SARAH MULLALLY DBE
106TH ARCHBISHOP OF CANTERBURY**



Born in Woking in 1962, with two sisters and one brother. Sarah attended Winston Churchill Comprehensive School and Woking Sixth Form College and then was educated at South Bank Polytechnic and Heythrop College, University of London. She became a Christian at the age of 16.

Before being ordained, Sarah worked as a nurse in the National Health Service, which she has described as ‘an opportunity to reflect the love of God’. In 1999, at the age of 37, she was appointed the Government’s Chief Nursing Officer for England in the Department of Health and was made a Dame Commander of the Order of the British Empire in 2005 in recognition of her outstanding contribution to nursing.

While working as the Chief Nursing Officer for England, a call was discerned to ordination with training for ministry following at the South East Institute for Theological Education. Ordination followed in 2001, initially serving as a self-supporting minister, before leaving her government post in 2004, which she has described at the time as ‘the biggest decision I have ever made’.

In 2012, she was installed as Canon Treasurer at Salisbury Cathedral and three years later took the role as Suffragan Bishop of Crediton in the Diocese of Exeter, the fourth woman to become a Bishop in the Church of England. On 12th May 2018 Bishop Sarah was installed as the 133rd Bishop of London at St Paul’s Cathedral, the first woman to hold the role.

Sarah was elected as the 106th Archbishop by the College of Canons of Canterbury Cathedral on 25th November 2025 and her election was confirmed on 28th January 2026 in St Paul’s Cathedral, London.

INTRODUCTION TO THE SERVICE

Welcome to all of you from our Chapter and from our staff, our volunteers and this community of faith.

This holy place became established following the arrival of Augustine from Rome in 597 as a missionary to the ‘Angles’. The historian Bede tells us that

Augustine, strengthened by the encouragement of St. Gregory, in company with the servants of Christ, returned to the work of preaching the word, and came to Britain. At that time Æthelberht, king of Kent, was a very powerful monarch ... he gave them a dwelling in the city of Canterbury, which was the chief city of all his dominions; and, in accordance with his promise, he granted them provisions and did not refuse them freedom to preach ... They were constantly engaged in prayers, in vigils and fasts; they preached the word of life to as many as they could; they despised all worldly things as foreign to them; they accepted only the necessaries of life from those whom they taught; in all things they practised what they preached and kept themselves prepared to endure adversities, even to the point of dying for the truths they proclaimed.

The Cathedral serves the Diocese of Canterbury, encompassing East Kent which includes prosperous villages, growing communities of new housing and vibrant market towns. There are ex-industrial and mining communities and there is a necklace of coastal and island communities marked by deprivation. The port of Dover is significant for commerce, travel and the place where desperate vulnerable people try to come ashore in hope of sanctuary. As climate changes, grapes producing sparkling wine are replacing apples and cherries.

The Diocese, led by the Right Reverend Rose Hudson-Wilkin, Bishop of Dover and Bishop in Canterbury, seeks to double the number of children and young people in the church, alongside establishing up to 200 new worshipping communities whilst seeking signs of revitalization in every parish, benefice and deanery.

The Cathedral, dedicated to Christ, is inspired by Jesus the Good Shepherd. This includes developing faith and spirituality, championing arts and outreach programmes, addressing Carbon Zero, improving accessibility, widening access (such as offering free entry to refugees and those living on Universal Credit) and seeking to become once again England's premier site of Christian pilgrimage.

Today's service includes a Mandate from His Majesty King Charles III giving instruction to install the new Archbishop. She will be installed first as Archbishop of Canterbury in the *Cathedra* in the Quire by the Archdeacon of Canterbury. The Dean will then install her in the ancient Chair of St Augustine, in which Archbishops have been installed for many centuries, symbolising her wider ministry, including as 'primus inter pares' of the bishops of the Anglican Communion.

The cope and mitre worn by the archbishop were commissioned when she was first consecrated. The morse is decorated by the buckle from her belt worn as a nurse serving in the National Health Service.

The crosier presented as part of the installation was used by Archbishop Geoffrey Fisher, the last Bishop of London to become Archbishop of Canterbury. He received this in 1961 as a gift from the thirty-three bishops and metropolitans of the then Anglican Communion.

Archbishop Sarah wears the pastoral ring given to Archbishop Michael Ramsey in Rome by Pope Paul VI on 24th March 1966. This signalled the growing friendship between Anglican and Roman Catholic Churches.

Because of its resonance with the Cathedral's Benedictine past, and the powerful messages of its imagery which speak to the modern age, *The Saint John's Bible* has been chosen for the Archbishop's Corporal Oath in the Nave. This is instead of the late 6th century *St Augustine Gospels*, which were used in installations between 1945 and 2013, because of the vulnerability of that manuscript. *The Saint John's Bible Heritage Edition* which was gifted in 2023 to this Cathedral. The original is believed to be the first-hand illuminated bible made by Benedictines for over 500 years.

The icons placed at the high altar depict the Virgin and Child and Christ as the Way as he holds the gospel of John open at the words 'Je suis le chemin' (I am the way). They were written by Brother Raphael from the Benedictine Community in Bec, Normandy. The Abbey of Bec provided several former Archbishops of Canterbury, including Lanfranc and Anselm. The Cathedral still has a close relationship with the sisters and brothers of Bec.

The music for the service led by the Cathedral Choir made up of boy and girl choristers, who attend local schools, alongside male and female Choral Scholars and Lay Clerks under the leadership of Dr David Newsholme and Mr Jamie Rogers. The choral music includes a composition by Thomas Tallis (1505-85) who was Lay Clerk at Canterbury. Psalm 150 is by Matthew Martin (b. 1976) who was previously an organist here. Joanna Marsh (b. 1970) is a leading British composer. Her anthem 'All Shall be Well' sets texts from Mother Julian of Norwich, celebrating the contribution of female scholars and writers down the ages.

Additionally, music is included from the global church including a Kyrie sung in Urdu. Music to greet the proclamation of the Gospel is provided by the African Choir of Norfolk with their members drawn from a wide range of countries across the sub-continent.

The hymns have been chosen by Archbishop Sarah, including hymns reflecting the Feast of the Annunciation. As the angel brought good news to Mary, so we pray that we may receive God's good news, his saving gospel.

Through the ceremony, legality and formality of this service, we are invited like Mary to say our own 'yes' to God. As she brought Jesus into the world through her faithful obedience, we are invited to do likewise and to live that in lives of courageous service, confident yet gentle proclamation and generous engagement both within the church and across the world.

We welcome our 106th Archbishop of Canterbury and our first female archbishop on this Feast traditionally known in England as Lady Day. Archbishop Sarah has already repeatedly said that if we wish to go fast, we go alone but if we are to go farther, we should go together. That challenge stands before us all today.

Archbishop Sarah, I invite you to affirm the Declaration of Assent I now put to you. This Declaration, used at the beginning of every new ministry in our Church, is a reminder both to you and to all assembled of what the Church of England is, and the basis of its faith, life, worship and witness.

The Archbishop of York reads the Preface

The Church of England is part of the One, Holy, Catholic and Apostolic Church, worshipping the one true God, Father, Son and Holy Spirit. It professes the faith uniquely revealed in the Holy Scriptures and set forth in the catholic creeds, which faith the Church is called upon to proclaim afresh in each generation. Led by the Holy Spirit, it has borne witness to Christian truth in its historic formularies, the Thirty-nine Articles of Religion, The Book of Common Prayer and the Ordering of Bishops, Priests and Deacons. In the declaration you are about to make, will you affirm your loyalty to this inheritance of faith as your inspiration and guidance under God in bringing the grace and truth of Christ to this generation and making Him known to those in your care?

The Archbishop of Canterbury responds

I, Sarah Elisabeth Mullally, do so affirm, and accordingly declare my belief in the faith which is revealed in the Holy Scriptures and set forth in the catholic creeds and to which the historic formularies of the Church of England bear witness; and in public prayer and administration of the sacraments, I will use only the forms of service which are authorized or allowed by Canon.

The Archbishop lays her hand on the Book of the Gospels and the Dean says

You, Most Reverend Archbishop, shall make your Corporal Oath on these Holy Gospels of God which you thus hold, that you will inviolably observe the ancient and approved customs of this Cathedral and Metropolitan Church of Christ, Canterbury, and that to your best ability you will give help and assistance in defending the rights, statutes and liberties of this Church.

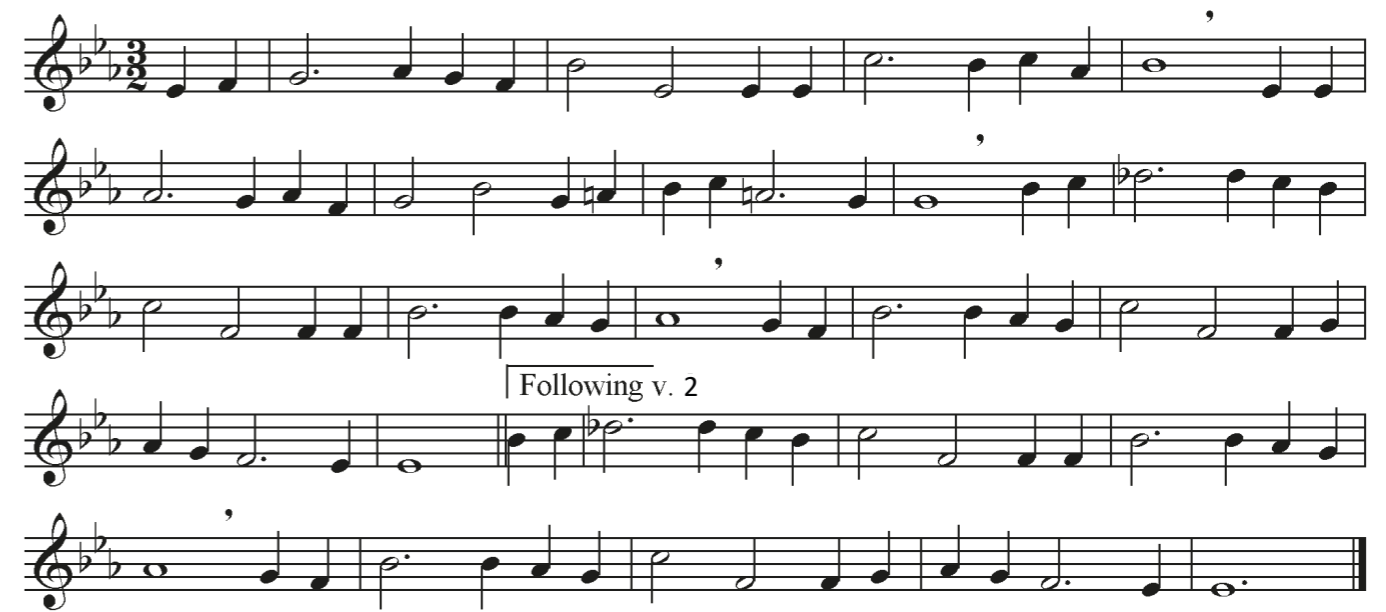

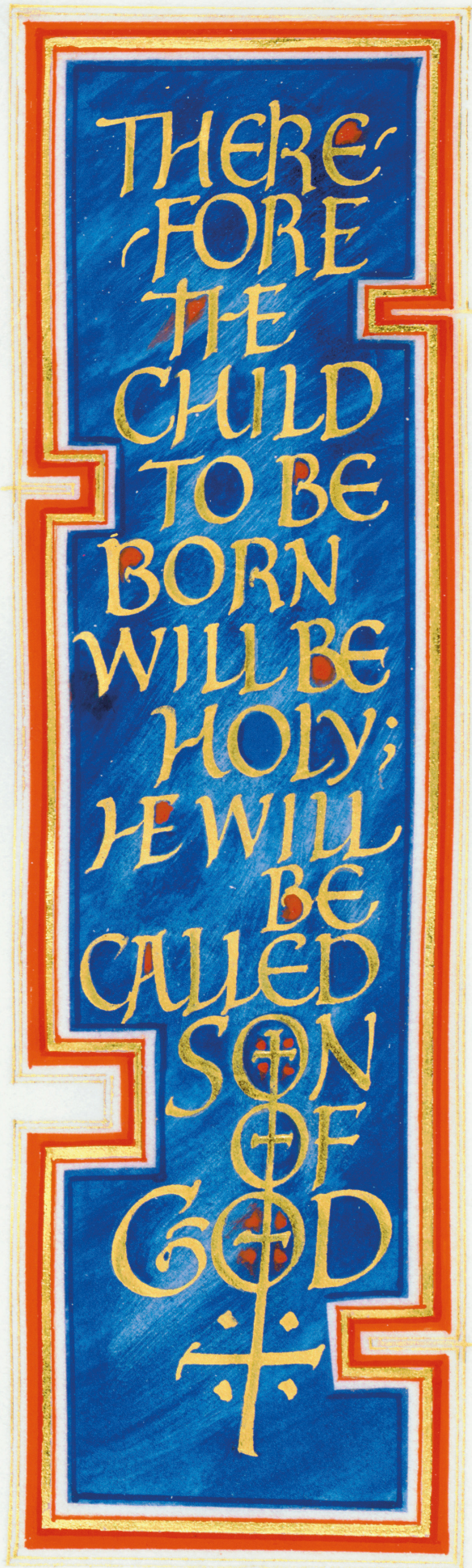
