Conference on Religion, Environment & the Common Good, 19-20 June

Religions can play a crucial role in working towards the Common Good by addressing contemporary concerns about the environment.

This conference discusses how the concept of “the Common Good” can resonate across diverse faith traditions as they seek to address the current ecological crisis. What are the ethical and political consequences of a solidarity which, having its origin in the transcendent, extends in many contrasting ways beyond humans to non-human others, and can transform all? How is the Common Good understood by different faith communities as the enactment of environmental virtues and citizenship? Lectures will be focusing on the late Pope Francis' ground-breaking encyclical *Laudato Si*, Christian voices from Anglican, Orthodox and non-conformist traditions and Jewish and Christian theologies of the land, striving for a generosity of vision in an often polarised and fractured world. Refugee and Asylum Seekers Memorial Boards Display

Monday 16 - Sunday 22 June, during visiting hours - Eastern Crypt

Throughout Refugee Week at Canterbury Cathedral, there will be a free* exhibition of name boards displaying and memorialising the names of those who have died in Calais or at sea in the past few years. These memorial boards are a moving response to the danger that seeking asylum can involve and a reminder of why we must care for those fleeing danger and persecution. The Diocese in Europe, Diocese of Canterbury and USPG (United Society Partners in the Gospel) have combined resources to support the work of the Anglican Refugee Support Lead in Calais and northern France, Bradon Muilenburg. Bradon runs a range of projects and programmes in Calais and has been key in preparing the memorial board display. He will be available in the crypt to answer any questions between 19-22 June. **Included free with a valid Cathedral Admission Ticket, Cathedral Pass, Friends' Card, student card and Refugees (ARC cardholders). Bradon will be in Canterbury on **Wednesday 18th June at 3pm in the Crypt** to talk about the boards, how they came into being, and what they signify for him and those with whom he lives and works. The talk will be followed by a short service of prayers. **Free talk; with retiring collection.**

Discussion Panel on Safe Routes with National and Local Experts

Wednesday 18 June, 18:30-20:00 in the Clagett Auditorium, Cathedral Lodge

Successive governments have pledged to 'stop the boats', whilst the numbers of asylum seekers crossing the English Channel continues to rise year on year. Statistics tell us that the majority of those who arrive on our shores after the treacherous journey have a legitimate claim to asylum. But could a better system of claiming that asylum be devised and created? Do our government's policies need revision? Does the rhetoric need to change? How can we mitigate the danger to exiles in France, the UK and the Channel? And how does this all relate to the bigger picture on global migration? Join us for this panel discussion and question time, with Lord Alf Dubs (of the Dubs amendment), Bishop Rose of Dover, Domenica Pecoraro, Kent Refugee Programmes Manager for the Social Justice Network, Bradon Muilenburg, Anglican Refugee Support Lead in Northern France, Dilys Alam, National Public Policy Advisor to the Church of England and chaired by the Very Revd Dr David Monteith, the Dean of Canterbury.

LIMITED TIME ONLY FREE* ART INSTALLATION moon landing: an immersive music and textile collaboration, 9 June - 31 August 2025

This summer, the medieval splendour of Canterbury Cathedral will complement a stunning free-to-view* modern art installation inspired by the little-known story of the women who wove the integrated computer circuits and memory cores which enabled the 1969 moon landing.

The breathtaking installation moon landing - a duo work created by British textile artist and designer of woven textiles, Margo Selby, and award-winning composer, Helen Caddick – comprises a vibrant 16-metre hand-woven textile suspended from the ceiling near the Cathedral's Trinity Chapel, created in response to the moon landing score, an original musical piece scored for strings. It is a celebration of the mathematical and technical possibilities of weaving and the crossovers of pattern, tone and rhythm found in both music and woven textiles. Margo translates Helen's music into textile art. The stripes within the textile reflect the rhythm of the music. With both artists in dialogue across the creative process, Helen's evocative score echoes the strings of a loom and the binary code used in weaving, reflecting the involvement of Navaho women in the creation of the circuits and the Huguenot weavers who brought their craft to London in the 17th century, a heritage craft that Margo upholds.
