Welcome

Canterbury Cathedral is the seat of the Archbishop of Canterbury, the Cathedral Church of the Diocese of Canterbury, the Mother Church of the Anglican Communion, and a place of pilgrimage welcoming visitors from across the world.

For over fourteen hundred years God has been worshipped here. With its roots in the Benedictine tradition, the ongoing daily pattern of morning and evening prayer and Eucharist continues the prayers and praises of countless generations in this Cathedral.

Alongside this we host a large number of special services, some regular, some occasional. These mark the feasts of the Church's year and significant events in the life of our local community, or offer opportunities for exploring faith and spirituality in creative and diverse ways.

Whether you are a regular worshipper with us, someone who has come to the Cathedral for a special event, or a visitor making a once in a lifetime journey to Canterbury, you are most welcome and an equal part of this community whose story reaches back to Augustine's mission to England in 597.

We invite everyone who attends our services to contribute to the ongoing costs of maintaining this beautiful Cathedral and investing in our ongoing ministry. It costs us approximately £30,000 a day to care for the building and people of this place and to continue to invest in the high quality of music that is offered here. WORSHIP

Regular worship

At the heart of Cathedral life is the regular rhythm of daily prayer. The day begins each morning with the quiet, said services of Morning Prayer and the 8.00am Eucharist, and ends with the service of Choral Evensong or Said Evening Prayer. In term time Children's Church meets on Sunday mornings. The Cathedral's principal act of worship every week is the 11.00am Sunday Choral Eucharist.

Visiting Choirs

The Choir of All Saints, Fulham sings for the Eucharist and Evensong Sunday services. It has broadcast on BBC1 and Radio 4, and has toured widely around the UK and in Europe. Its singers come from across and beyond London. The choir frequently commissions new works from established and up-and-coming composers, including its own members. In addition to singing services the choir also performs a number of concerts and workshops each year, often with professional instrumental groups.

Canterbury Chamber Choir, founded in 1995, puts on regular concerts of sacred and secular choral and dramatic musical works. Their concerts, with conductor Peter Futcher, aim to entertain and educate as well as to help local charities raise much needed funds.

Kent College Choristers come from Kent College, Canterbury. They have had much success in various national competitions, having been finalists several times in BBC Songs of Praise Young Choir of the Year, Barnardo's Choir of the Year and the National Festival of Music for Youth. They also tour abroad, and have sung in a number of European Cathedrals. Many of the Choristers have been selected for the Cathedral Girls' Choir, including several present members.

The choir of **St Mary's Parish Church, Hendon**, in north London, consists of about 24 adults and choral scholars, with a separate children's choir. They sing the weekly services in Hendon's ancient parish church, which dates back to Norman times, as well as frequent concerts.

The choir of St John's, Barham consists of local people of all ages who love to sing traditional English church music. They sing regular Eucharists and occasional Evensongs and are currently preparing a full programme of music for Lent, Passontide and Easter.

The University of Kent Cecilian Choir is a by-invitation choir comprising University of Kent staff, students and alumni. Repertoire ranges from Hassler to Hepplewhite, with a particular emphasis on contemporary works. The Choir is delighted to welcome back choral alumni singers to participate in the service of Choral Evensong, as a special event falling as part of the University's sixtieth anniversary celebration throughout the year.
