The Cathedral is mostly made of Stone

Nave Pillars – very tall, thin/slender, all of stone and with many thin shafts.  
Quire Pillars - shorter, alternating round and octagonal, decorative tops (flowers and leaves etc) and with additional thin marble shafts.

There is a lamb in the roof boss

There is an eagle holding the Bible

Henry VIII had six wives (not eight!)

Catherine of Aragon, Anne Boleyn, Jane Seymour, Anne of Cleves, Catherine Howard and Catherine Parr. There is a rhyme to remember their fates:  
“divorced, beheaded, died, divorced, beheaded, survived”!

There is a candle where the shrine used to be

The items hanging above the Black Prince’s tomb are:

Shield, Gloves, Helmet and Tunic.

These are only replicas, but the originals can be seen in the glass case on your left at the bottom of the steps, just before you get to the Bossanyi windows

The Bossanyi windows are brighter if the sun is shining, more symbolic but probably less precious than the old windows. The medieval windows of Canterbury Cathedral is one of the finest and most precious collections of stained glass in England
