It gives me real pleasure to be writing an introduction and welcome at the beginning of the Cathedral Music List for services throughout September. Gradually worship in the Cathedral is returning to a pattern of daily services and especially choral services which have been impossible in the last seventeen months during the time of restrictions imposed by the pandemic but this programme of regular services for choirs and congregations gives a real sense of a new beginning. Most of the choral services will be available on-line for those who would like to enjoy them but cannot be present in the Cathedral and for the first time we are producing a booklet which gives music for the whole of the month. The music of a Cathedral has always formed an essential part of worship for both choirs and congregations and the ability to come together to hear psalms, canticles and anthems sung and to join in with hymns day by day enriches our life and gives us huge encouragement. September sees a new beginning and we all rejoice and give thanks for it.

Concerts

On Friday 1 October, the opening recital on the Cathedral's newly-rebuilt organ will be given by distinguished international concert organist, Nathan Laube. Nathan will play a varied programme designed to show off the extraordinarily expressive scope of the instrument following its major overhaul by notable organ builders Harrison and Harrison.

There will be two further recitals given later in the term by the Cathedral's resident Assistant Organists, Adrian Bawtree (Friday 15 October) and Jamie Rogers (Friday 19 November). All organ recitals will start at 7.30pm and will last approximately 70 minutes.

Additionally, three jazz concerts have been curated by the Cathedral's Acting Second Assistant Organist, Jamie Rogers, who is also Head of Jazz Studies at Queen Mary's University in London. These will take place in the Crypt at 7.30pm on Friday 24 September, Friday 8 October, and Friday 12 November.

On Saturday 20 November, the Girls and Lay Clerks of the Cathedral Choir will perform J.S. Bach's Christmas Oratorio in the nave. They will be joined again by internationally-acclaimed period instrument ensemble, The Harmonious Society of Tickle-Fiddle Gentlemen, and a stellar line-up of soloists.

WORSHIP

At the heart of Cathedral life is the regular rhythm of daily prayer. The day begins each morning with the quiet, said services of Morning Prayer (Matins) and the 8am Eucharist, and ends with the service of Choral Evensong with music from the Cathedral Choir or one of the many excellent visiting choirs who come to sing during the Cathedral Choir's holidays. The Cathedral's principle act of worship every week is the 11am Sunday Choral Eucharist.
