# WELCOME

---

## Welcome

Canterbury Cathedral is the seat of the Archbishop of Canterbury, the Cathedral Church of the Diocese of Canterbury, the Mother Church of the Anglican Communion, and a place of pilgrimage welcoming visitors from across the world.

For over fourteen hundred years God has been worshipped here. With its roots in the Benedictine tradition, the ongoing daily pattern of morning and evening prayer and Eucharist continues the prayers and praises of countless generations in this Cathedral.

Alongside this we host a large number of special services, some regular, some occasional. These mark the feasts of the Church's year and significant events in the life of our local community, or offer opportunities for exploring faith and spirituality in creative and diverse ways.

Whether you are a regular worshipper with us, someone who has come to the Cathedral for a special event, or a visitor making a once in a lifetime journey to Canterbury, you are most welcome and an equal part of this community whose story reaches back to Augustine's mission to England in 597 AD.

## Visiting Choirs

**The King's Counterpoint** is a semi-professional choir from Charleston, South Carolina, returning to the UK after their first visit in 2018. They are joined by members of Contrapunctus Early Music for this residency.

**The choir of Christ Church, Greenwich** (Connecticut) consists of members of separate choirs of boys and girls, part of a busy music department with six active choirs. They rehearse and sing services multiple times each week, with repertoire from the Anglican choral tradition accompanied by a new 4-manual Harrison & Harrison organ. Christ Church choristers are joined for this residency by singers drawn from cathedrals and collegiate churches across the UK.

**The Surrey Singers** is a group of singers from various church choirs from Surrey and the surrounding Home Counties, and provides support for resident choirs who are on holiday.

**The Occasional Singers** is a group of local singers who meet a few times each year to sing services in the Cathedral. The choir is generally directed by one of the Cathedral organists and gives an opportunity for local singers to lead the worship during the Cathedral Choir's holidays.

At the heart of Cathedral life is the regular rhythm of daily prayer. The day begins each morning with the quiet, said services of Morning Prayer (Matins) and the 8.00am Eucharist, and ends with the service of Choral Evensong with music from the Cathedral Choir or one of the many excellent visiting choirs who come to sing during the Cathedral Choir's holidays. The Cathedral's principal act of worship every week is the 11.00am Sunday Choral Eucharist.
